September 21, 2022 - Press Release: Shropshire Good Food Partnership and Shropshire Council in support of Shrewsbury's Street Allotment Project

Shropshire Good Food Partnership has supported the Street Allotment Project with an E-bike which has kept them mobile this season amidst rising fuel costs. Fleur and Casper are able to get around the growing number of plots, pick up materials - from compost to tools and deliver produce. The E-bike will also be used to raise awareness about the project when its stationed in town, so as many people as possible can find out how to get involved or benefit from free fruit and veg.

The funding came from Shropshire Council as part of a project supporting vulnerable people to get involved in local growing initiatives and to connect with nature.
